REPORT OF THE CLOSED MEETING:

Chairperson Fehr reported on the discussion of one labour and one land issue.

TRUSTEE REPORTS:

a. School Reports

Trustee Stiglitz reported that the Tahsis Christmas Bazaar was a huge success with an outstanding number of tables and a great response from the community. Everyone is looking forward to the Christmas Concert on December 18th. Report cards were recently sent out to parents, and a staff Christmas gettogether is scheduled for December 10th.

Trustee Mann reported that the Ray Watkins Elementary School report cards went out on December 2nd, with parent-teacher interviews following on December 4th and 5th. The PAC meeting was held on December 2nd and this past weekend was the PAC Christmas Market. A community lunch is scheduled for

December 10th and the Holiday Concert is coming up on December 18th. The last day of school is December 19th.

Trustee Smith reported that the Zeballos School Girls' Basketball Team won the recent District Basketball Tournament! There are many basketball activities happening at the school and several people are stepping up to coach. The Zeballos students had the ability to take first aid and food safe certifications in November, and there have been two trips to Tahsis to use the rock wall. There was a recent complaint about certain levels of respect which the Principal addressed by having several people from the Nuu-chahnulth Tribal Council present a workshop for students. It will be repeated on December 10th with the community, and will also include a school dinner.

Chairperson Fehr reported that she was unable to attend the PAC meeting at Gold River Secondary School but will have a report for the next Board meeting.

b. BCSTA Trustee Academy

Chairperson Fehr reported on a successful Trustee Academy with many good speakers and workshops. The official opening on November 28th featured keynote speaker Severne Cullis-Suzuki, Environmental Activist, who spoke on 'Educating Our Students for a Changing World'. References were made to the following reports:

Canada's Changing Climate Report (Federal Report)

Canada's Top Climate Change Risks

Zeroing in on Emissions (Tom Green) and Ten Key Strategies to Bring Down Canada's Emissions

The Academy re-opened on November 29th with a Ministry of Education welcome from Minister Rob Fleming who spoke on the passing of Bill 41, *UN Rights of Indigenous Peoples*. He expressed the Ministry's support of School Districts and the co-governance model which gives students many opportunities. He indicated that there was no real update regarding the Funding Model Review. All support staff bargaining has concluded and teacher bargaining is still underway with the help of the mediator. Recruitment and Retention – there are sponsored seats for French and First Nations at BC Universities.

<u>Plenary 1</u> - Dr. Jill Birch, Leadership and Organizational Change Expert, presented "How Will We Create Better Leadership for Our Future?" with key points as follows:

- 1. Trends impacting leadership
 - Rise of the strongman
 - · Flooded with fractured information
- 2. Leadership needs a recode
 - · Impacted by cell phone DAD (Digital Attention Deficit)
 - · Become selfless
 - Always learning, always unlearning
 - Need to become relationship leaders
 - · Know yourself
 - · Teach ourselves together
 - Know your world
 - · Watch your step (navigate change)
 - Seek higher ground (ethical, trustworthy, build commitment)
 - Critically reflect

<u>Plenary 2</u> - Mr. Anthony McLean, Youth Motivational Speaker, spoke on "Leadership, Mental Health, Inclusivity":

- · What kids won't talk out, they will act out
- Antidote to bullying is empathy
- Learn to self-regulate and de-escalate
- What can you do to make students mentally healthy?

There were several concurrent sessions:

<u>Kairos' BC Blanket Exercise</u> – A hands-on way to explore the nation-0to-nation relationship with Indigenous peoples, allowing people to think critically about reconciliation, empowering people in building bridges of understanding and respect. The Blanket Exercise is an excellent means of educating Canadians about the history of this land and heighten awareness of reconciliation through this very important and powerful activity.

A Pathway to Hope, Understanding BC's Mental Health and Addictions Strategy – The Provincial Government has released its vision for mental health and addiction care, "A Pathway to Hope". The report has significant implications for public education. As Boards of Education strive to improve student outcomes, trustees must understand these repercussions to ensure their strategic plans are aligned to support student wellness.

Facing the Challenges of an Interrupted Education – Recent trends indicate an increased number of newcomers to Canada are settling outside of urban cities in favour of suburbs and more recently, rural towns. The Government of Canada's 2019-2021 Immigration Levels Plan targets an increase to 350,000 Permanent Resident Admissions per year by 2021 including 51,700 Refugees – a 20% increase from the 2018 target. Refugee families have complex needs which, from a perspective of students in a school system, include huge gaps in education. Students who have lived in refugee camps arrive to school having never sat in a classroom or held a pencil. Their academic needs are significant, as teachers work to help students acquire language, literacy and numeracy skills, as well as social skills required to work and play safely in a school environment. Members of the English Language Learners (ELL) Consortium shared stories of ELL and newcomer students and their families and highlighted different ways districts are meeting the settlement and educational needs within their own communities.

November 30th started off with BCSTA Branch Breakfast Meetings, including a meeting of the Vancouver Island School Trustees' Association where it was decided that the VISTA Spring meeting will be held in Nanaimo and the Fall meeting in Port Hardy.

<u>Plenary 3</u> – Mr. Brian Woodlands, Peel School District in Ontario, spoke on "Making Public Education – and Your Leadership – Matter in a Fake News World":

- Leadership is a process, not a destination, and requires leaders to be focused caring, listening, and being respectful – and being passionate about the right things – tell the personal stories;
- How to become the "anti-Kardashian" and break through the clutter to deliver key messages, both internally and externally: be sincere and real build a genuine connection with others, be nice, be authentic, be kind and aware of how we treat each other
- Gain an awareness of new vs old techniques and tools, the power of truth in a social media world of the fake, and what will make an impact on a hard-to-reach public
- Create consensus not conflict
- Be unfailingly honest, always tell the truth, support inclusion and equity
- Always be willing to learn take our mistakes and make them beautiful
- Be the participant, not the observer
- Inspire success, confidence and hope

Plenary 4 — Mr. Mike Lake, Member of Parliament, spoke on "Expect More: An Autism Adventure". Honourable Mike Lake had many unique opportunities to share his life experiences, including as father to his non-verbal son who has autism. He has spoken to spouses of world leaders at the UN General Assembly in New York City, travelled to London, Paris, Geneva, and Washington to speak with fellow elected officials from across the political spectrum, and addressed global leaders at the World Health Organization and in the international research community. He has also spoken to a Global Citizen audience of 60,000 people in Central Park, and he and his son have shared the stage in front of 15,000 enthusiastic students at WE Day. His goal is to share his son's personal story to help change the way we think about the people around us — their abilities, their challenges and the unique contributions each person can make to the great benefit of all of us.

<u>Plenary 5</u> – Pilot School Districts Report – "FESL Work to Date" – Reporting out by three of the Funding for Enhanced Student Learning (FESL) designated pilot districts:

- Engage partners and set priorities
- · Plan for learning
- Measure impact and communicate progress
- Equity in engagement explore, engage, support
- Looked at their past three years and looked forward
- Asked students What do you want the world to be like in the future?
- · Equity and excellence
- Employee engagement survey got it from North Vancouver District
- School Learning Plans must align with District Learning Plan (use formative assessment to get plans in line)
- Monitor student achievement

<u>Plenary 6</u> – Simon Jackson, Movement Builder and Founder of the Spirit Bear Youth Coalition, who spoke on "Advancing Nature Literacy". 'Naturelabs.ca' – contains resources for teachers (Grade 10 English and Social Studies). Spirit Bear is a story teller.

c. Working Relations Committee Meeting

Executive Summary

As at December 31, six months or 50% of the 2019/20 fiscal year and four months or 40% of the school calendar year has elapsed. The budget amounts shown in this report are the 2019/20 preliminary budget amounts based upon the Spring 2019 estimated enrollment for 2019/20.

At this time, the year to date revenue and expenses are trending as predicted in comparison to the budget for the School District.

Revenues

At the end of June 2019 the District had an operating surplus of \$1,003,741 (L/Y\$1,036,442) of which \$504,000 was allocated for use in the current year leaving an unrestricted surplus of \$500,000. We are currently using approximately \$700,000 to balance the budget, however, it likely will not all be required by year-end.

To the end of December 2019, the District received \$2,568,907 (2017-\$2,308,002) in MOE operating grants. This is 41% (L/Y 45%) of the total grants to be received.

To the end of December 2018, the District received \$1,588,444 for the LEA (2018-\$1,384,488; 2017-\$1,480,000).

Operating expenses last year were 57.7% of budget. Currently the variance is 57.7% of budget so the District is right on track with spending.
