#### **REPORT OF THE CLOSED MEETINGS:**

Chairperson Fehr reported on the discussion of three labour issues and two land issues.

#### TRUSTEE REPORTS:

#### a. School Reports

Trustee Hanson extended a special welcome to new teachers at Kyuquot Elementary Secondary School: Bryson Marks, Catherine Lundy and Matthew Thompson.

Chairperson Fehr provided a report from Gold River Secondary School. There will be an NSOP cross-country ski trip on January 21<sup>st</sup>, a school spirit activity on January 22<sup>nd</sup> and an international student joining GRSS next Monday until April 17<sup>th</sup>. Term 2 ends on January 28th, Term 3 starts on February 1<sup>st</sup> and report cards will be distributed on February 8<sup>th</sup>.

#### b. LEA/EA Meeting

A short meeting was held in December and focussed on the two VIU courses – ILRP 100 and Education 450 – and with a thought towards using those as a foundation for a new teacher orientation to the District. A teacher's guide was discussed, and Vicki White will provide an update at the end of January. There was some discussion around budget, and the need to ensure that there is proper consultation with each community around the spending of targeted funds.

#### c. Working Relations Committee Meeting

A meeting was held on December 15<sup>th</sup> to discuss Teacher Teaching On Call (TTOC) travel costs and the admin trailer at Kyuquot and Zeballos, TTOC call-out transparency and availability, COVID issues specific to mask-wearing and health checks, the timing for in-service for the literacy project, and remedy and the timing of TTOC notifications.

#### d. District Policy Review Committee Meeting

A meeting was held on January 11<sup>th</sup> to review Sections A and B policies. A proposal to amend Policy B.32, *Community and Commercial Use of Facilities and Grounds for Child Care*, will be brought forward to the February meeting as a 'notice of motion to amend'. No other changes to Sections A and B policies are required at this time.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

#### a. Budget 2020-2021

The Superintendent/Secretary-Treasurer reminded the Board that the amended budget for 2020-2021 will be brought forward to the Board in February for finalization. He reviewed the budget process which is as follows: (1) enrollment projections are submitted to the Ministry in February; (2) the District is notified of its draft budget amounts towards the end of March; (3) a preliminary budget is approved by the Board in May; (4) the final budget allocation is confirmed by the Ministry in December; and, a final amended budget is presented to the Board in February for approval.

#### b. Update on Capital Projects

As a result of Ministry funding this year, the following capital projects (Carbon Neutral (CNCP); School Enhancement (SEP)) are in progress or completed:

#### Current Issues:

- The boilers at Gold River Secondary did not pass inspection. An emergency installation of a propane boiler was completed over the Christmas Break (rental at \$7,000/month). In speaking with the Ministry's Capital Planning Department, the earliest that grant money can be expected for GRSS heating is the Spring of 2022. The Ministry advised of the option to use \$150,000 of the funds allocated this spring (for Kyuquot School), for GRSS instead.
  - Option 1 (preferred) Repair one of the diesel boilers using Annual Facility Grant/surplus dollars, and run it for one more year and then plan to replace the heating system in the Spring of 2022 unless the amalgamation of the Gold River Schools is a go ahead. The information gained during this period should help in the design going forward (about \$350,000).
  - Option 2 Try to come up with a \$150,000 solution that allows the heat pump to pre-heat a boiler (electric or propane preferably electric).
- Backup power at Kyuquot School and teacherages, and working with High Tide Energy to complete
  the plan which will be a combination of solar panels, power wall and generator. Although most of the
  funding is anticipated through CNCP grants and AFG, the District may need to invest some local
  capital into this project.

The BC Public School Employers' Association Representative and Alternate will be Trustee Stiglitz and Trustee Fehr. The BC School Trustees Association Provincial Councillor and Alternate will be Trustee Fehr and Trustee Hanson.

#### b. Spring Community Consultation Meetings and Preliminary Budget 2021-2022

The Superintendent/Secretary-Treasurer reported that the District is in funding protection by about \$35,000 and, regardless of enrollment, will receive 98.5% next year which makes it a little easier for planning in terms of budget. It is anticipated that the District's enrollment for next year will decline by approximately 20%, largely because of Nisaika Kum'tuks and Tsawalk Learning Centres going to SD68 (Nanaimo-Ladysmith). Traditionally, spring community consultation meetings are held to discuss the school calendar, budget and any other topics of interest – and this year will include a discussion of the draft Framework to Enhance Equity and Achievement. Due to the COVID restrictions around gatherings, the Board agreed that a District meeting will be held by Zoom on two separate days - February 22nd and 23rd - to provide flexibility for people to join on whichever day works best for them. Chairperson Fehr suggested Trustees gather input from communities on what they would like to have included on the agenda.

#### SUPERINTENDENT/SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT:

#### a. District Update

Due to COVID, Zeballos students were largely kept at home for approximately seven weeks prior to the Winter Break, with school work sent out to students as much as possible. The good news is that the First Nations communities in the area have now been vaccinated, and offers of vaccination went to the staffs of Kyuquot and Zeballos as well. Although students are now returning to school, there will be major challenges in the District in terms of the students' learning gaps and allowances will have to be made for that, moving forward. Vancouver Island continues to be one of the safest places and, as of yet, there have been no COVID cases in any of the District's schools. The 'normal' field trips are on hold, with only day trips taking place in accordance with safety plans.

#### b. Enrollment Report

The enrollment is currently at 395 students, down considerably from the 474 FTE from last year – and expected to drop close to 300 FTE after this school year. Unfortunately, when looking at the projections, there are still larger classes at the higher grades than at the lower grades, so the trickle-down effect will continue until young families move into the District.

#### c. Finance Warrants

As of the end of December, the District is on track with its budget – being 40% of the way through the school year and having about 58.1% of the funding left.

Mrs. Katrina Kornylo from GRSS expressed appreciation to Mr. Deane Johnson for the work over the Winter Break to ensure that there would be heat on in the school.

Ms. Judy van Boven from KESS expressed appreciation to the Board for sending out the box of Christmas chocolates to Kyuquot School. She inquired if there is room in the budget to provide a covered play area and a small trampoline for one of the special needs students, and she was advised to discuss these questions with her Principal. Ms. van Boven also expressed appreciation to the Superintendent/Secretary-Treasurer for all of the work that he does.

#### School District 84 Vancouver Island West Framework for Enhancing Equity and Achievement

#### Introduction:

School District 84 strives to improve the life chances of all of our students through education, and we are pleased to present this comprehensive revision of our Education Plan to our communities and families. We are committed to ongoing improvements in our practice to fully meet the needs of our students and this new three-year plan provides direction and guidance for our work with a clear focus on equity, improving outcomes, and enhancing learning for our students.

#### **District Context:**

Vancouver Island West School District 84 is composed of five small schools in the communities of Gold River, Kyuquot, Tahsis, and Zeballos, a district Continuing Education program, as well as two learning programs in Nanaimo that are transitioning to SD68 in June of 2021. We are a rural, remote district with a student population of approximately 400 students, 60% of whom identify as Indigenous.

#### What the Evidence Tells Us:

While there are many success stories across our district, there is a critical and persistent disparity in achievement between Indigenous and non-Indigenous students. This disparity is evident in early achievement indicators and persists throughout the school years, leading to low graduation rates for Indigenous learners. Because we are committed to improving the life chances of all students, SD84's foci as presented in this Education Plan address overcoming the equity gaps evident in our system:

- Improving Early Literacy to ensure that students have the foundational skills to support their learning
- Increasing School Engagement leading to Graduation to ensure that students graduate with dignity, purpose, and options
- Equipping learners for success by developing the attributes necessary to be successful educated citizens

#### Our Goal:

Students will develop into confident, independent learners who can effectively communicate their goals for learning and their future.

#### Theory of Action:

By creating systemic structures that develop our district and schools into collaborative professional learning communities that are focused on learning, results, and community based partnerships, we will create learning environments that are:

- equitable,
- trauma-informed,
- culturally responsive,
- inclusive

where all students receive the supports they need to develop into independent learners and effective communicators.

#### Focus 1: Building a strong foundation of literacy

Learners require a solid foundation of literacy to achieve success in school and beyond. While non-Indigenous students in SD84 have achieved at or above provincial average on provincial measures of early literacy for the past three years, Indigenous students in SD84 have not achieved parity with their non-Indigenous peers in our district nor with Indigenous students across the province. In reviewing our Early Development Instrument (EDI) data it is clear that many of our students enter school vulnerable. It is imperative that we intervene early to improve these student's educational trajectories and life chances.

<u>Objective 1.1:</u> Indigenous students will achieve at or above provincial average in reading comprehension by the end of Grade 3.

<u>Target:</u> Within three years, 75% of Indigenous students in SD84 will be on-track or extending (meeting or exceeding expectations) for reading comprehension by the end of Grade 3.

<u>Objective 1.2:</u> Students will develop as independent learners by developing proficiency in communication.

<u>Target:</u> Within three years, 75% of Indigenous students who were not meeting reading expectations in Grade 4 will be meeting expectations by Grade 10.

Our learning targets have been set to achieve parity for Indigenous learners in SD84 with all students across the province of British Columbia within three years. Because our evidence clearly demonstrates a disparity in the achievement of Indigenous learners when compared to their non-Indigenous peers we will be focusing our efforts on ensuring that Indigenous learners receive the support and interventions required to meet expectations in reading. This requires training for primary educators to ensure that we are providing high quality and culturally responsive reading instruction, early identification of students requiring additional supports, and targeted interventions to support those learners.

#### Focus Area 2: Student engagement and connection to school

Evidence shows us that Indigenous learners in SD84 do not graduate at the same rate as their peers within the district or across the province. Three critical factors which influence graduation are attending school, being engaged while at school and feeling connected to school. It is critical that all learners feel that they belong in their school and that the educators in the school care for them, believe in them, and provide them with the support they need in order to learn. School absenteeism can be both a symptom of a learner's lack of engagement and a cause of further learning challenges, and many learners in SD84 have very high rates of absenteeism. Increasing school engagement and connectedness will result in more students graduating with dignity, purpose, and options.

<u>Objective 2.1:</u> Improve engagement of Indigenous learners leading to successful completion of Dogwood graduation.

<u>Target:</u> Within three years, graduation rates for Indigenous students in SD84 will meet or exceed the provincial average for all students.

<u>Objective 2.2</u> Increase attendance of Indigenous learners to maximize opportunities to learn and prevent them from falling behind

<u>Target:</u> Within three years, decrease by half the number of indigenous students with high absenteeism.

We need to ensure that all students are engaged with their learning and connected to their school in order for them to graduate. Our results show that we have not met that mark with Indigenous learners. Our targets for graduation are to bring our district up to provincial averages for 5 year Dogwood graduation. However, while not lowering our expectations, we must also ensure that students who require extra time receive the support they need in order to graduate so we also include measures for 6-8 year graduation.

#### Focus Area 3: Equipping learners for success

Recent community consultations reveal that there is a need for our students to build resilience and learn to care for their mental health. Further, our secondary students report feeling unprepared for their future. While our graduates enter post-secondary at the same rate or above provincial and regional averages, this number is influenced by our overall low graduation rates; as our graduation rate rises we must ensure that we continue to ensure that students are prepared for the next stage of their lives. Guided by BC's vision for the Educated Citizen, we are committed to ensuring our students develop in the core competencies: think critically and creatively, communicate effectively, and thrive personally and socially. We will focus on developing students into resilient, goal-directed learners who are equipped for future success as Educated Citizens regardless of their plans after graduation.

Objective 3.1: Learners will graduate prepared for success in post-secondary education and careers.

**Target**: Within three years, 70% of learners will attend post-secondary within three years of graduation.

**Objective 3.2:** Learners will develop the core competencies of communication, thinking, and personal and social responsibility

**Target:** Within three years, 90% of students will identify that they are developing in the core competencies (communication, thinking, personal & social responsibility)

**Objective 3.3:** Students will develop resiliency

**Target:** Within three years, 90% of students will identify that they are learning to care for their mental health

While our post-secondary entrance rates currently present as close to provincial average or above, we must ensure that our efforts to increase graduation rates (Goal 2) do not just end with more students just "crossing the stage" – all of our graduates need to leave school equipped for future success.

#### **Strategies**

#### Focus 1: Building a strong foundation of literacy

#### Strategies 1.1:

- Professional learning in research-based culturally responsive early literacy pedagogy
- Use of early screening to identify vulnerable students
- Develop and implement evidence-based culturally responsive early intervention strategies
- Teacher collaborative inquiry group focused on improving literacy for Indigenous learners
- Build parent, guardian, and community capacity to support early (ages 0-5) literacy through collaboration with community agencies through the VIW Children's Health Hub
- Provide schools and classrooms with authentic indigenous texts

#### Strategies 1.2:

- Development of individual Student Learning Plans for all students (aligned to Pathways program) which include students' strengths, community assets to support learning, goals for the future, barriers to success, and strategies to overcome the barriers
- Regular monitoring and adjustment of strategies to support Pathways plans
- Integrate Pathways planning into existing individualized support plans (e.g. IEP's, Student Learning Plans)

#### Focus Area 2: Student engagement and connection to school

#### Strategies 2.1:

- Professional learning in culturally relevant Indigenous pedagogy
- Implementation of a Pathways plan for each Indigenous student in Grades 6-12 to identify student strengths, community assets, barriers to success, and strategies to overcome barriers
- Equity Scan to identify and address systemic barriers to graduation
- Engage local knowledge keepers in development of calendar of local culturally relevant learning opportunities
- Con-construction of interdisciplinary Nuu-chah-nulth curriculum with local First Nations

#### Strategies 2.2:

- Daily monitoring of student attendance and follow-up on all absences
- Tiered attendance intervention plan developed in each school

- Training for upper intermediate and secondary teachers in ILRP program through VIU to support transition of Indigenous students to post-secondary programs
- Increase opportunities for secondary students to visit post-secondary institutions
- Facilitate visits from postsecondary representatives to remote K-12 schools to improve student awareness of postsecondary opportunities at an early stage of their secondary years
- Formalize learning opportunities partnership agreement between VIU, NTC and SD84
- Haahuupa camp to build student familiarity and relationships for transition to VIU

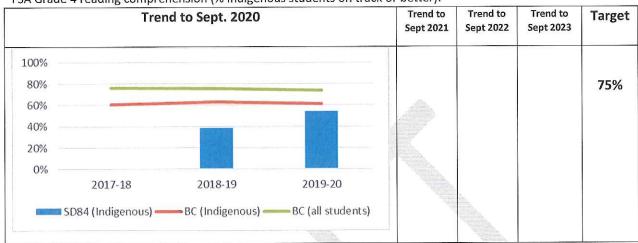

FSA Grade 4 reading comprehension (% Indigenous students on track or better):

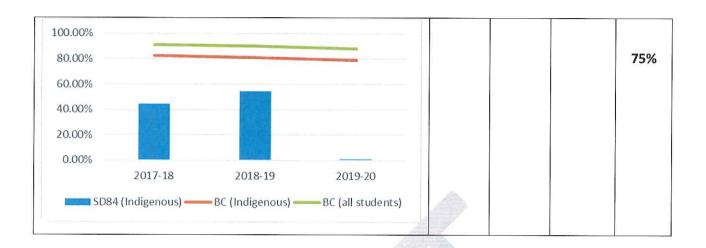

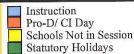
