#### **PUBLIC INQUIRIES AND PRESENTATIONS:**

## a. Mr. Jim Baron, Principal, Captain Meares Elementary Secondary School

It is five weeks into the school year with the school decks shiny and smooth, the mainsail raised, and The Captain Meares cruising comfortably at seven knots with a fine new crew and thirty-one passengers. In five weeks, the Captain Meares team has welcomed no less than ten new students to our fine school. Maureen Roth, our amazing janitorial/lunchtime supervisor, has had to add extra tables to the mess hall to accommodate our growing lunch time crowd.

Vice-Principals Amanda Girgan and Ben Anderson have been powerful additions to our well-seasoned staff. Amanda brings a wealth of knowledge and skills to her junior secondary classroom. Her students have been fully immersed in dystopian novels, family trees and some very timely democratic election studies. She plans to offer some brand new courses to Captain Meares such as Law and Drama. Her students are happy, working hard and engaged in their learning. The junior secondary students have also benefitted from Amanda's extensive coaching and physical education experience while sharpening up their volleyball skills for the big Volleyball Jamboree in Gold River in November. She intends to share her love of sports with all of our students.

Around the corner and down the hall, Ben Anderson has crafted a calm safe haven for his primary/elementary charges. The students are learning to fill each other's buckets with amazing acts of kindness. Ben is completing his Masters in Counselling and his

collaboration and insights have been a valuable addition to the Captain Meares team. Ben will also be sharing his academic expertise and various talents with the students from the junior secondary crew.

Mr. Baron have been working towards providing a comprehensive music and arts program for the students of Captain Meares. The new music room is outfitted with a wide variety of instruments. We have started a guitar group, an instrumental ensemble group, and we are beginning plans to begin a school choir in November who will be an integral part of our Remembrance Day Assembly in November and Christmas Concert towards the end of December.

We are pleased to announce a newly elected and very enthusiastic PAC who will be working closely with the Captain Meares Team to help us provide enriching educational experiences for all of our students. We are also excited to have another four years working with our energetic and committed Trustee Allison Stiglitz.

The staff has planned to have a special back to school barbeque for all of our parents and students coming up this week on Thursday October 13th. We are expecting almost 100 people to be in attendance along with live music and spontaneous dancing.

Our local firefighters will be doing a special presentation for our all of our students in conjunction with fire prevention week. They will be followed by the legendary Waste Diversion Presentation artists at the beginning of November.

We are all looking forward to an exciting year with lots of promise and possibilities for our staff, parents, and students. We are full speed ahead!

Chairperson Fehr reported that one land and three labour issues were discussed, as well as the need to reschedule the November Inaugural and Regular Board meeting to Friday, November 18, 2022.

### a. School Reports

Trustee Hanson shared Kyuquot School's first newsletter which was filled with exciting news and events, and beautiful and colourful photos! Highlights from last month included:

- Launched the full day meal program for students
- Harvested blackberries, cucumbers and zucchini for processing food with Elementary STEM
- · Relaunched our Intermediate Drum Group
- Welcomed guest presenters from Oceans Network Canada
- Freediving with KCFN Warriors
- Premiered the KESS Cultural Documentary from Spring 2022
- Launched "A.W.E.N." (Almost Weekly Elementary News)
- Hosted Orange Shirt Day on Aktis Island in honour of Truth and Reconciliation Day
- · Welcomes 20222 KCFN Career Fair and community guests from all sectors
- · Debuted the new Library Space for students

#### b. Enhancement Agreement/Local Education Agreement Meeting

The Superintendent/Secretary-Treasurer reported that the well-attended September meeting was held in conjunction with the Curriculum Implementation Day in Gold River, to talk about last year's progress and projects going forward. Out of 319 students registered in the District this year, 171 or about 60% are Indigenous. The budget was set, and a report presented on the Teacher Education Program with Indigenous teacher candidates at both Ray Watkins and Zeballos School and a video crew there now to do a film about the projects. The District received good news on the Human Rights Exemption request to allow priority hiring of First Nations people for jobs, which will be helpful when local Indigenous people start to graduate from the Teacher Education Program. The District continues to look for pathways to bridge local people into the teacher education program and other post-secondary opportunities within community, such as Early Childhood Education, Youth and Child Care and Education Assistant programs. These would provide good options for new and young parents and those who wish to stay in their communities. The Pathways Program and its curriculum was discussed, and the goal to promote staff awareness of Nuu-chah-nulth language, history and culture by offering two VIU courses: the Indigenous Portfolio course (ILRP 100) and the upper level Education Course (EDUC 450) which offers participants the opportunity for critical reflection on their learning from ILRP 100. ILRP 100 is free, offered for two hours, twice a month (4-6 pm) - one synchronous class over zoom and one a-synchronous class for participants to work on their own. The courses are open to all Nuu-chah-nulth communities and anyone interested in registering should contact Tania Smethurst, VIU Instructor and Office of Indigenous Education and Engagement, at Tania.smethurst@viwu.ca. Community meetings are scheduled to address the equity scan and renewing the Enhancement Agreement: October 18 in Kyuquot, October 24 in Zeballos, and November 21-22 in Tsaxana (date for Tahsis TBA).

#### c. Working Relations Committee Meeting

The meeting on October 3<sup>rd</sup> addressed two topics: cleanliness in one of the schools and recruitment/retention and ways that the Union could assist in putting out the word that the District needs teachers.

The Superintendent/Secretary-Treasurer reported that this year's Curriculum Implementation Day, which focused on Indigenous Education, was a wonderful day of connecting together. Staff, special guests and community attended from across the District and enjoyed the opportunity of meeting and getting to know each other and to see that the District is a cohesive body.

#### b. Enrollment Report

There are 338 students registered, including homeschoolers, continuing education and international students, and results in funding for about 319 FTE students. The District will remain in funding protection for this year.

The District is on track with its spending and, compared to this time last year, has spent 2% less.

#### Re: Special Program Approval - First Nations Hiring

On June 23, 2022, School District No. 84 (Vancouver Island West) applied for a Special Program designation for a five-year period for preferential hiring of self-identified First Nations applicants in all positions with the School District until the proportion of self-identified and qualified First Nations employees equals the proportion of self-identified First Nations students.

First Nations peoples face historical and ongoing marginalization in Canada and continue to have lower education outcomes than the general population. First Nations peoples need, and benefit from, role models of First Nations ancestry who can facilitate learning that is consistent with their knowledge, culture and traditions.

The School District notes that for well over one hundred years, First Nations students on the west coast of Vancouver Island were forcibly removed form their communities and required to attend residential schools. This has led to intergenerational trauma, distrust, and a feeling of not belonging that continues to disadvantage First Nations students. Of note, the six-year completion rate for Indigenous students in the School District is significantly lower than the provincial average for Indigenous students, which in turn is significantly lower than the average for non-Indigenous students.

The School District explains that the Special Program will increase the number of First Nations teachers and support staff in schools. When these spaces better reflect the student population, they will be safer, more welcoming, and more culturally attuned to these students. This is anticipated to lead to greater attendance rates for First Nations students and, over time, will help to rebuild trust and community connection. Students will also be exposed to role models and will see a path toward becoming educators or education workers themselves. It is hoped that over time this will help to revitalize Nuuchalnulth language and culture.

Based on the materials before me, I am satisfied that the equality-enhancing purposes of section 42 (Special Programs) of B.C.'s *Human Rights Code* (Code) are advanced by the School District's initiative to

engage in preferential hiring of self-identified First Nations applicants in all positions with the School District until the proportion of self-identified First Nations employees equals the proportion of self-identified First Nations students.

As a result, I am prepared to grant the application for Special Program approval pursuant to s.42(3) of the Code for a five-year term.

The Special Program is effective as of the date of this letter and expires on **November 2, 2027**. This Special Program will not be considered a contravention of the Code while this approval remains in effect. If you intend to apply for a renewal of the Special Program approval, please submit a renewal application at least 90 days prior to the expiry date to better ensure the renewal request is dealt with in a timely manner.

This Special Program approval is granted on the condition that the School District provide a mid-term report to my Office by March 31, 2025, approximately half-way through the five-year term, and a final report when the program expires. Failure to provide a report may result in the Special Program being cancelled or a renewal not granted should one be requested.

All mid-term and final reports are required to provide information on the actions taken as part of the Special Program, how any barriers in implementing the Special Program have been addressed, and whether and to what extent the Special Program is meeting its goal of ameliorating disadvantage faced by the target group.

In addition, your mid-term and final reports should include the following information:

- Number of jobs posted under the Special Program and number of self-identified and qualified First Nations employees hired under the Special Program, as well as data on the retention of these employees over time. Please separate this data for teachers, staff, and administrators.
- The percentage and overall change in the number of teachers, staff and administrators selfidentifying as First Nations in comparison to the proportion of First Nations students for each year the Special Program has been active.
- Measures of attendance, achievement and graduation rates for Indigenous students as well as for the total student population for each year the Special Program has been active.
- Any other impacts of the program, such as qualitative descriptions of the benefits to students, families, and to broader communities achieved through the Special Program.
