Strategic Plan 2020 - 2025

Our Goal:

Students will develop as independent learners who can effectively communicate a strong sense of personal and cultural identity and engage with their goals for learning and their future.

Focus 1: Building a Strong Foundation of Literacy

- -Cross district teacher collaboration
- -District Literacy Team (principal, teacher and Indigenous support teacher)
- -Common District assessments
- -School Learning Reviews
- Early learning supports (Strong Start, Health Hub)

Focus 2: Student Engagement and Connection to School

- -Experiential learning (NSOP, NCN Leadership 10-12)
- -Extracurricular and co-curricular trips/activities (sports, Adventure Class)
- Pathways lessons and professional learning
- Tiered attendance interventions

Focus 3: Equipping Learners for Success

- -Post-secondary connections (partnerships, site visits, programs, training)
- -Mental health (self-regulation, mental health literacy)

Current Outcomes from the Strategic Plan*:

- 1) There is demonstrable improvement in literacy achievement. Literacy results have improved consistently and significantly in the early years, and this year the district met our target of having Indigenous students achieving at or above the level of all students in the province.
- 2) Graduation rates are steadily increasing. The five-year Dogwood graduation rate has been climbing over multiple years, with significant growth for both Indigenous and non-Indigenous learners.
- 3) Though there is relatively little inequity on early years measures of achievement (i.e. grade 4 FSA), disparities in achievement are present in most other measures for Indigenous learners, including those living both on and off reserve and become more pronounced in higher grades.
- 4) Achievement results are higher in grade 4 than our achievement results in grade 7 and grade 10.
- 5) Grade to grade transitions have improved.
- 6) Achievement results in numeracy are very low, particularly at the grade 7 level.
- 7) The proportion of students who report feeling safe, welcome, cared for, and that they belong at school has been slowly and steadily dropping.
- 8) Student attendance remains a significant challenge.
- 9) The district's strategic engagement with Indigenous rightsholders is helping to build a positive and productive partnership to improve outcomes for Indigenous children.
